

M. A. CHANDLEY LAID TO REST

Deceased Was Widely Respected
Citizen Of Madison County

Mr. Mitchell Alexander Chandley, one of the most widely known and respected citizens of Madison County, died at his home near Marshall about seven o'clock Sunday morning, May 16, 1926, following an illness of heart trouble about three months. Mr. Chandley was 81 years old. He recently had printed and distributed to his friends a booklet giving his experiences in the Civil war. Interment was in the city cemetery Monday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock, following the funeral service at his residence conducted by Dr. W. E. Finley of Burnsville, assisted by Rev. C. B. Newton and Rev. H. L. Smith of Marshall. The pallbearers were: Messrs. George Sams, E. R. Tweed, Nat Holcombe, Z. V. Fisher, Beulah Tweed, and Dr. W. A. Sams.

The deceased was known throughout the entire Western North Carolina section as he was for a number of years affiliated with the Department of Internal Revenue and also served as clerk of court for Madison County a number of years. He took an active interest in works carried on by the Grand Army of the Republic and had for two terms served as the organization's commander.

Mr. Chandley's first wife, who was before marriage Miss Sebina Tweed, died in 1915. At the age of 71 years the deceased married Mrs. Eliza Rice. The survivors are the widow; three sons, R. C. Chandley, postmaster at Greensboro; S. S. and E. O. Chandley, of Asheville, and five daughters: Mrs. W. C. Sprinkle, of Weaverville; Mrs. J. W. Thomason, and Mrs. Estelle Neighbors, of Spartanburg, S. C.; Mrs. T. N. James of Lincolnton, and Mrs. J. N. West, of Marshall.

The brothers and sisters surviving are: Mr. J. C. Chandley, White Rock, N. C., Mrs. George Hensley, of Marshall, N. C. Mrs. Wm. Higgins, of Flag Pond, Tennessee, and Mrs. Joseph Blankinship, of Flag Pond, Tenn.
